- Workforce standards pursuant to Assembly Bill 680 (Burke, Chapter 746, Statutes of 2021).
- Additional potential Funding Guidelines updates.

The Funding Guidelines apply across all California Climate Investments programs and provide guidance to administering agencies on developing their own guidelines and solicitations, estimating greenhouse gas emissions reductions and other project benefits, and tracking and reporting benefits, including benefits to priority populations. The upcoming workshop is an opportunity to learn more about potential updates and share input on these efforts.
