AB 617 Background


Historical focus on regional air quality

Significant improvement, but disproportionate

burdens remain

Need for community-level focus

- Address cumulative exposure
- Take advantage of advances in monitoring technologies





Focus on Community Action

Community focused framework

- Community-level air quality monitoring
- Community emissions reduction programs
- Accelerated retrofit of pollution controls on industrial facilities
- Enhanced emissions reporting requirements
- Increased penalty provisions for polluters
- Grants to local community groups



Community Air Grants - Background

 The Community Air Grants Program was created to provide community-based organizations (we refer to these as CBOs) in California with logistical and technical assistance to support their efforts in improving local air quality, in line with the goals of Assembly Bill 617 (AB 617). AB 617 was passed by the Legislature and signed by Governor Brown in August 2017.



Community Air Grants - Background

 California Health and Safety Code, Section 44391.2, subsection (d): The state board shall provide grants to community-based organizations for technical assistance and to support community participation in the implementation of this section and Section 42705.5 [AB 617].



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Community Air Grants – Purpose

 The purpose of the Community Air Grants Program is to provide community-based organizations in California with logistical and technical assistance to support their efforts in improving local air quality, in line with the goals of AB 617.



Community Air Grants – Eligibility

- A California community-based organization holding a current tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- A California organization holding a tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as the Grantee, in partnership with a California community-based organization without Section 501(c)(3) status designated as a sub-grantee.
- A California Native American Tribe. For the purposes of this grant, this includes all Federally Recognized Tribes, and other California Native Americans, in accordance with Governor's Executive Order B-10-11.
- A California faith-based organization that qualifies for tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, to the extent consistent with law.

Community Air Grants – Program Concept

- Projects shall further the purposes of AB 617 in California communities. Such projects could be within the following categories:
 - Informational
 - Participatory
 - Technical



Community Air Grants – Project Types and Grant Amounts

Conceptual Category	Project Examples	Max Grant Amount
Informational	Community and neighborhood level meetings	Up to \$50,000
Participatory	Sensitive receptor assessments	Up to \$150,000
Technical	Community violation reporting systems	Up to \$500,000



Community Air Grants

- Funding to support
 - Capacity building training and support
 - Assistance for community-led air monitoring
 - Technical assistance



Community Air Grants – MQs and Project Administration

 Three minimum qualifications that if not met will result in an automatic failure of the applicant.

 Some costs are ineligible for reimbursement at this time



Community Air Grants – Budget

The budget should include some of the following:

- Direct costs
- Services and Supplies
- Equipment





Community Air Grants – Criteria Scoring Table and Scale

Criteria Scoring Table				
CRITERIA	POINTS			
I. Applicant Background and Project Description - 20 Points Maximum				
Background information ⁺ includes:				
 History of applicant in community. Proof of the applicant's IRS designation as a 501 (c) 3; or documentation as a California Native American pursuant to Governors Executive Order B-10-11; or documentation of faith-based organization; and list of organization's board of directors, or an organizational chart. Community description and narrative on air/environmental issues. Support for applicant's project in the community (evidenced by letter of support). Applicant's connection to the community. Concrete examples of applicant representing or advocating in and for their community. No more than 500 words, or less than two pages. 				
* For projects proposed jointly by a California organization holding a tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (the applicant), in partnership with a California community-based organization without Section 501(c)(3) status (the sub-grantee), provide this information regarding the subgrantee. You may additionally provide this information regarding the applicant, if applicable.	0-20 points			



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Community Air Grants – Deadline

 The signed original coversheet with application including budget, and 2 photocopies of each, must be mailed (postmarked) no later than Thursday, April 12, 2018.
 Electronic submittals will not be accepted.



Community Air Grants – Important Dates

- March 27, 2018 teleconference
- April 3, 2018 Q&A will be released
- April 12, 2018 Final deadline for all applications



Community Air Grants – Next Steps

- April/May: Solicitation evaluations.
- May: Awardees announced.

- June: Grant Agreements must be signed by grantee and executed by CARB by June 15.
 - CARB anticipates working closely with grant awardees in order to sign and execute agreement.
