#### Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act

- Designed to ensure a "state body" conducts its business openly and transparently
- Requirements:
  - Task Force needs quorum of at least 7 members to hold meetings
  - Information given to Task Force as a group must also be made available to the public
  - Task Force meetings must be public
  - Task Force quorum may not deliberate outside of noticed meetings
    - Includes informal gatherings unless they are purely social gatherings
  - Task Force members need to avoid serial communications that involve more than 6 members

# Task Force Mandate (1 of 2)

- Assembly Bill 398 (Garcia, Chapter 135, Statutes of 2017)
  - Provide guidance in approving new offset protocols for the purpose of increasing offset projects with direct environmental benefits in the state while prioritizing:
    - Disadvantaged communities
    - Native American or tribal lands
    - Rural and agricultural regions

# Task Force Mandate (2 of 2)

- Assembly Bill 293 (Garcia, Chapter 85, Statutes of 2019)
  - Consideration of additional offset protocols, including but not limited to:
    - Enhanced management or conservation of agricultural and natural lands
    - Enhancement and restoration of wetlands
  - Recommendations on joint development of natural and working lands offset projects under approved Compliance Offset Protocols

#### **Report Format Proposal**

- Include an Executive Summary listing recommendations
- Appendices at end of report, not after each chapter
- Overall report format options:
  - Keep the report as is as far as the unique framing of each chapter,
    OR
  - Reformat the initial draft report to have more consistency across chapters

#### Proposed Schedule

- Pursuant to the Task Force Charter, the Task Force will prepare a final written report within one year of convening

# Subgroup Recommendations: Overarching/Programmatic Considerations (1 of 3)

- Options for expanding utilization of offsets
  - Improve invalidation requirements
  - Allow offset usage limits to be traded among compliance entities
  - Consider recommendations regarding allowance supply adjustments
  - Recognize that compliance grade offsets can be a tool for helping achieve other state and federal climate policy initiatives

# Subgroup Recommendations: Overarching/Programmatic Considerations (2 of 3)

- Specific to disadvantaged communities, Native American or tribal lands, and rural and agricultural regions
  - Project development loans and subsidies
  - Project consolidation across fragmented tribal land ownership
  - Pricing agreements
  - Project inventory and verification streamlining
  - Investments and partnerships incentives
  - Land and project conversions
  - Agency technical support

# Subgroup Recommendations: Overarching/Programmatic Considerations (3 of 3)

- Criteria for prioritization of new protocols and amendments
  - •Air quality and environmental justice considerations
  - Prioritize benefits for California: direct environmental benefits in the state
  - Aggregation of project participants
  - Efficient use of CARB resources

## Subgroup Recommendations: Blue Carbon/Wetlands

- Review American Carbon Registry's Restoration of California Deltaic and Coastal Wetlands Methodology for recommendation as a compliance offset protocol
- Support continued research, and explore climate finance options to support project development within blue carbon/wetlands ecotypes

# Subgroup Recommendations: Livestock, Agriculture, and Rangeland

- Protocols which can be developed with existing scientific research
  - Avoided grassland conversion
  - Cattle feed additives to reduce enteric fermentation
  - Diversion/conversion of cattle manure storage from anaerobic to aerobic systems
- Practices where protocols could be developed, but there are scientific or economic barriers
  - Compost applications to grazed grasslands (offsets alone unlikely to overcome economic barriers)
  - Subsurface drip fertigation with manure or synthetic fertilizer (more research needed to quantify under specific cropping scenarios)
- Practices where significant additional research is necessary
  - Limited or no-till agriculture (quantification/permanence of carbon sequestration)
  - Cover crops (quantification/permanence of carbon sequestration)

#### Subgroup Recommendations: Urban Forestry

Consider adopting the Climate Action Reserve (CAR) Urban Forest Management Protocol v.1.1 after making modifications to address ongoing issues such as cost and scale

# Subgroup Recommendations: Ozone Depleting Substances

- Ozone depleting substances (ODS) protocol
  - Add R-22, R-134a, R-125, R-32, and R-143a as eligible; do not add halons
  - Reduce scope of regulatory conformance to activities directly affecting ODS processing and destruction
  - Modify ODS foam baseline to better align with current recovery and reuse
  - Update GWP factors for refrigerants, refrigerant substitutes, and 10-year emission rates
  - Allow ODS sourced from the federal government as eligible
  - Review the current American Carbon Registry (ACR) ODS protocol

## Subgroup Recommendations: Mine Methane Capture

- Mine methane capture (MMC)
  - Update MMC protocol to facilitate more projects that will reduce venting methane
