Background of Original Regulation


- 2
- Measure to reduce R-134a refrigerant emissions from do-it-yourself automotive AC servicing
- Adopted by the Board in January 2009 as a Discrete Early Action Measure
- □ Became effective on January 1, 2010

Regulatory Requirements

- □ Self-sealing valve on all containers
- □ Deposit and recycling programs
- □ Consumer education program
- □ Product certification and labeling requirements
- □ Annual reporting of container sales and returns

Goals of the 2017 Amendments

- □ Further reduce GHG emissions
- □ Maximize the container return rate
- □ Ensure the unclaimed deposits are used for the benefits of consumers and the environment
- Expand the scope of how the unclaimed deposits are spent



The Approved Amendments

- Details to the requirements for retailer to transfer unclaimed consumer deposits to manufacturers
- □ New requirements of annual reports
- Expanded scope for spending the unclaimed deposits
- □ Elimination of the deposit adjustment provision
- □ New can labeling requirements

Major Amendments for Retailers



Container deposit fixed at \$10



New report requirement

 Included in the annual report the amount of deposits collected, unclaimed and transferred (due March 1)



□ Transfer of unclaimed deposits

- All unclaimed deposits collected during the preceding year must be transferred annually to manufacturer or its designee (due April 1)
- □ For the year 2017, the period covered is April 13 December 31

Major Amendments for Manufacturers/Designees



- Expanded scope of enhanced education programs
 - Improvement of container and deposit return rate
 - Benefits on low-income communities and consumers that purchase small containers
 - Programs, projects, and measures reducing greenhouse gas emissions, approved by ARB
 - Examples include improved recycling/disposal of old refrigerants, and research, evaluation and promotion of low-GWP refrigerants

Major Amendments for Manufacturers/Designees



- □ New requirements of annual reports
 - Report I: expending plan of Enhanced Education Program for the next year (due May 1, starting 2018)
 - Report II: expenditure report
 - Amount of deposits transferred from retailers
 - Amount of deposits collected from retailers/distributors
 - Accounting and description of expenditure on Enhanced Education Programs in the previous year (due May 1, starting 2019)

Major Amendments for Manufacturers





- Certification requirements
 - Label to include "Do not vent" in English and Spanish
 - Description of Enhanced Education Program moved from certification to annual report



- □ Exempt period for modified labels
 - Containers packaged/manufactured for sale in CA during Apr 13 - Dec 31, 2017 are exempt from the new labeling requirements

- Working group for the management and spending of deposits
- Improvements/alternatives to deposit and recycling program
- □ In concert with national program adopted by U.S. EPA
