



California's Sustainable Communities Policy Framework


- Make it possible to drive less

Encourage people to drive less


- Information and incentives

How Are We Doing Compared to Our Goals?




Californians Continue to Drive Alone as Their Primary Mode of Travel

Transportation Investments by Mode Vary Across the State




In the Most Urban Regions, Significant Investments in Transit But Also In New Roadway Capacity

RTP/SCS funding allocations by mode and purpose for "big four" MPOs




Transit Ridership is Falling

	Instrument	Emphasis
	CAPTI	Aligning State transportation funding and incentives to locals to meet VMT reduction and climate goals in an equitable way
	AB 285	Research and policy recommendations for aligning State CTP and regional RTP/SCS transportation plans to improve achievement of GHG reduction goals
	CTP 2050	Long term plan setting a vision for the future of the State transportation system and meet State policy objectives around climate, equity, and public health
		Tracking progress on SCS implementation, what is working and what are the challenges, how do we get greater implementation of regional plans?
	2022 AB 32 Scoping Plan Update	Statewide plan for achieving climate goals, which includes strategies to reduce GHG emissions from transportation.



2022 SB 150 Progress Report

- Changes to regional strategies since 2018
- Top challenge areas for implementation by region
- Supportive and not so supportive State policy and funding changes





Sustainable Communities in the 2022 AB 32 Scoping Plan Update


Identify outcomes for additional reductions and further support implementation of regional strategies





Observations from Existing Studies on Policy Options

- Need a combination of strategies
- Land use and road pricing strategies needed to make significant progress







Strategy Area 1: Transportation Planning and Investments

How we plan for transportation projects and what transportation funding should support

Strategy Area 2: Transportation System Management

How we can leverage the existing transportation system to achieve more sustainable and equitable outcomes







Strategy Area 3: New Mobility

How we should approach emerging transportation options such as ridehail, scooters, autonomous vehicles, etc. to advance climate and equity goals





Strategy Area 4: Land Use

How to locate housing, places of employment, shopping, parks and conserve natural and working land uses more efficiently

Strategy Area 5: Housing

How to increase housing within existing communities and provide more affordable housing

What are key actions/improvements/policies you would like to see the State prioritize now in order...

- To advance sustainable communities and associated emissions reductions generally?
- To ease the ability of the underserved community/communities to reduce the amount of driving where possible?
- To avoid potential harms to underserved communities in design or implementation of land use and transportation strategies?
