

Circulate San Diego's Advocacy Model






Utilization Rates at MTS Opportunity Sites


CARES Act Funding

- Transportation for America and TransitCenter organized national advocacy effort
- Transit operators advocated separately (Let's team up!)
- Maintenance of Service
 - Anti-Transit v. Pro-Transit
- COVID Protection of Riders/ Operators
 - Collaboration between unions and advocates
 - Concerns about equitable enforcement
 - *Rear-door boarding/ touch-less fare payments*

- Essential workers are 35 percent of region's transit riders



MTS Board Approves Diversion Program for Fare Violators; Reveals Electric Bus Transition Plan

Thursday, June 18, 2020

San Diego - The San Diego Metropolitan Transit System (MTS) Board of Directors approved a fare enforcement pilot program that reduces fines and allows fare violators new options for paying off citations. Additionally, MTS staff unveiled a plan to convert nearly its entire bus fleet to all-electric by 2040.
